2. UN WOMEN

2.1 Introduction to the Committee

UN Women stands as a robust pillar of the UN, defending women's rights through programs, policies, and unwavering standards. At its core, the mission is singular and clear: to pave the way for every woman and girl to reach her full potential.

Around the world, women deal with disparities, from restricted access to quality jobs to imbalanced payments rooted deep in gender biases. It is of great concern how countless women and girls are continually denied crucial opportunities in education and healthcare. Their voices are little heard in the economic and political aspects, and the specters of violence and discrimination hang over them. However, in the midst of these challenges, UN Women emerges as a source of hope.

Born from a resolution by the United Nations General Assembly in July 2010, UN Women has solidified its role as the UN's agency that champions the causes of gender equality and women's empowerment ever since.

In its pursuit, UN Women elaborates and enforces standards, envisioning a world where all women and girls can exercise their human rights. Serving as trusted partners for advocates and decision-makers of all kinds, UN Women finds itself leading the noble quest for gender equality.

2.2 Discussing the impacts of rape culture in the education of children

The UN Women aims to further the worldwide debate on the rape culture. A term that has been used since the 1970s, the time of the second wave of feminism, to point out subtle or explicit behaviors that silence or relativize sexual violence against women. Addressing this topic and how it affects the education of children is sensitive but crucial, as it impacts both the mental and emotional well-being of children, as well as their perspectives on relationships, consent and personal boundaries.

The harmful environment cultivated by rape culture affects children's educational journey and development. Rape culture obscures the concept of consent, leading many growing children to erroneously believe that it's permissible to overstep personal boundaries when a clear 'no' isn't presented. This culture not only distorts gender norms—resulting in boys being exposed to the extremes of toxic masculinity and advising girls to alter their appearance or behavior to avoid unsolicited attention—but also distorts a child's self-image. Whether directly victimized by sexual harassment or indirectly influenced by rape culture, many internalize the blame, spiraling into feelings of guilt and shame. According to the www.who.it website, 6% of women globally report being sexually assaulted by someone other than their husband or partner. Given the high levels of stigma and under-reporting of sexual abuse, the true figure is likely to be significantly higher, as due to the rape culture, many of the victims fear having their trauma neglected.

In addition, the trivialization of sexual violence prevents children from understanding the emotional depth and repercussions of such actions, potentially impairing their ability to foster and sustain healthy relationships in adulthood. Fear of reprisals or the potential rejection of their experiences can lead many to retreat into silence, even when confronted with personal cases of harassment or assault. This silencing has lasting psychological implications. The repeated and pervasive exposure to rape culture may desensitize children, making acts of sexual violence appear as common atitudes. Therefore, it is more than clear that it is about time we stop ignoring the impacts such culture has in the education of many children worldwide.
